

# AN INNOVATIVE APPROACH TO COMMUNITY CASE MANAGEMENT

Working with community reentry participants, informed by INSIT results, shows great promise for structuring case management plans and effectively allocating resources for reentry. The INSIT strengths & needs assessment can quickly and effectively identify areas in which a participant needs support while reinforcing & leveraging existing strengths.

## THE FUTURE OF REENTRY ASSESSMENTS

The INSIT reentry assessment tool takes an innovative and dynamic approach to community case management, building on the strengths and needs of it's participants. The INSIT is designed to be tailored to support individualized case planning, measure program specific activities and services, and to identify emerging needs for future funding.

- INSIT was evaluated by Strategy and Evaluation, LLC using data from nearly 5,000 reentry program participants from the Work And Gain Education and Employment Skills (WAGEES) program in Colorado.
- The INSIT is not another risk assessment tool because community reentry work is not about risk. It is about quickly and effectively identifying participant needs, and the strengths they have to support their needs, that case managers can use to target programming and services.
- INSIT has a robust score distribution across the sample population making it accurately normed to the population it is intended to serve.
- The INSIT subscales accurately measure participant strengths and needs across each individual subscale.
- Individuals' scores on strengths and needs areas show the potential to demonstrate program impact when provided with relevant program participation.
- Participants who completed two INSITs, having participated in programming between them, showed improvement in the strengths and needs areas related to the programs in which they participated.
- The results from the INSIT tool show great promise in the creation of impactful case management plans.
- INSIT does not produce outcome bias due to participant race or gender.
